

Poisoning Of Russian Spy Shocks World

Two Weeks Later And Still No Answers...

On 4th March 2018 former Russian spy Sergei Skripal and his daughter, Yulia, were found unconscious in Salisbury.

Prior to this discovery Sergei and his daughter were witnessed walking through an alleyway next to the Zizzi's restaurant.

On the day a bystander found them, Sergei was seen slumped on a bench wearing formal clothing and his unconscious daughter was resting on his shoulders. They both looked grey and many witnesses thought they were asleep.

Both Mr Skripal and his daughter remain in a critical condition in Salisbury District Hospital.



It is suspected that they were poisoned by a very rare nerve agent but they also think that the poisoning could have been to do with something put in a drink or food in the Zizzi restaurant, suggesting one or both of them may have dined there beforehand.

We asked a school Chemistry teacher how he felt about this subject. He said, 'I'm am worried about this situation as we are partly to blame in the Physics department for teaching too much about radiation- this is what the pupils will not use in later life.'

He also thought we should have chemical weapon detectors installed in every school.

British police have identified more than 200 witnesses and are looking at more than 240 pieces of evidence in their investigation. Parts of Gillingham and Dorset have been cornered off as part of the ongoing investigation by the police.

As of now 38 people have been injured, 34 of those have been discharged and only four people are left in a critical condition.

The government have requested answers from the Russian's leadership but no explanations have been made. Russia failing to meet Tuesday's deadline to provide a credible explanation over the origins of the substance, Theresa May has invoked several sanctions

to send a clear message. Russia are denying their role in this event but are saying they will respond appropriately.

Russia have insisted it had no motive for the attempted murder but in 2004 Mr Skripal did betray dozens of Russian agents to British intelligence before his arrest in Moscow. Many people believe this does provide Russia with a motive.

Many people have spoken openly about how Russia have dealt with this situation. Theresa May says "Russia are being sarcastic, contempt and defiance and are not providing any credible reasons for what they have been accused off."
